In recent years, it has become a tradition to open the season with an event featuring a major Baroque figure and/or subject. This year, it is compositions for multiple harp-sichords, including J.S. Bach's Concerto for four harpsichords. The season continues with Windscape, a renowned wind quintet, joined by pianists Andrey Kasparov and Oksana Lutsyshyn in works for piano and winds by Beethoven and Liebermann.
